The Business Booster Fund offers unsecured loans of up to £5,000 over up to 36 months for a set monthly interest payment of £25 per £1,000, for specific projects or purchases that will help companies succeed or get to the next level.

Examples so far have included enabling a time lapse photographer to triple his income by buying three new cameras for renting out, and a plumber to purchase a set of new tools."

A life changing journey

n 2012, Paul Spence was a victim of an unprovoked attack which led to him suffering a brain haemorrhage. Facing many of the common challenges associated with brain injury, Paul's life fell apart and he struggled to make sense of the world as he battled during a long, challenging recovery.

Paul has gone on to be a source of inspiration to many others that have

been affected by brain injury. Since his injury, he has taken on numerous fundraising challenges, which has seen him complete a total of 22 marathons, he has scaled Mount Kilimanjaro and recently he became an Ironman.

Sharing his experience, Paul said "People are left lost, lonely, confused and vulnerable after brain injury. The injury can come with devastating circumstances and be life changing for everyone involved. I believe that following healthy lifestyle choices,



along with practicing coping strategies allows me to function at my best and therefore live the most successful life I can."

During his recovery Paul realised there was a real lack of support in the community for people affected by brain injury. Because of this, he knew there needed to be somewhere to go, a lifeline, a place to obtain **P**ositivity, **A**wareness, **U**nderstanding and **L**ove. This led him to set up the Hull based charity P.A.U.L For Brain Recovery, which opened its doors in 2016. Each month the charity welcomes over 100 visits from people affected by brain injury. The charity provides tailored support that aims to minimise the long-term physical and emotional consequences of brain injury, helping people to regain physical, cognitive, social and behavioural function and ultimately help them feel comfortable in the world again.

I was born and raised on Hull's Orchard Park estate, which was newly built at the time and had a fantastic sense of community. It was home to the UK's biggest baseball diamond, which regularly hosted the European championships. Our club 'The Danes' were local and national champions. Baseball played a big part in my life, and I was selected to represent Great Britain, but life changed for me when the Falklands war started.

I joined the British Army and was pushed to my limits, but my Orchard spirit shone through and made a good soldier of me. My first posting in 1984 wasn't the Falklands, but West Berlin; my guarding duties included the Berlin Wall and the notorious Rudolf Hess, Deputy Fuhrer to Adolf Hitler, in Spandau prison. I once came face to face with him and even as an elderly man, he was a menacing presence.

In 1985, I was posted to South Armagh in Northern Ireland for 2 years. At the time the area was bandit country and a no-go for the British Army. In fact, my battalion was the first to go back into Newry in 1986.

After another 2 years at Catterick Garrison in North Yorkshire, civilian life followed.

I achieved a diploma with distinction in IT and Business at Hull College; in those days opportunities in IT were scarce, and I was grateful to find a job with Andrew Jackson Solicitors. Eighteen years later I was still there!






However, I became frustrated by the slow pace of innovation. I left to help Nick Miller set up James Legal, which became and still is an acknowledged innovator with a fresh approach to legal services. I'm very proud of my contribution to that.

Then, there are those with all stages of dementia. Pubs and clubs are closing, the high street boarded up. For many, family live away and the only company is the television. The History Troupe devises and delivers stories steeped in local roots, heritage and futures. In the past 2 years over 21,000 people of all ages have been part of workshops, exhibitions and performances. Founder Rob Bell is clear that the best work has been with people living in Residential or Nursing homes.

"My mother Margaret died a couple of years ago with progressive dementia and I wrote a play to explore how a family copes – or doesn't. The Vote was



launched by our patron Hugh Pym, the BBC's Health Editor. We wanted to do more.

We have produced Memory Bank, Hull. This package of short films on Hull's story adds to Hull Daily Mail photos to be used in care homes to get the banter flowing again.

With St Marys College we have taken students along to mix with the likes of their grandparents; share the images that trigger all sorts of stories. For





many students this is the first time they will experience the fishing industry or the docks with the residents only too pleased to tell them about their common heritage.

This is what the Maoris call Whannau, a multi-generational community, at work. We are looking to launch an ambitious programme to give more young people the experience and more of our elders the buzz that they need.




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
